

Council Takes Action To Cut Off Lake County

The Geneva-on-the-Lake council has requested the Ashtabula County commissioners to proceed to notify Lake County commissioners of the termination of the water contract.

The action was a result of a unanimous vote by councilmen at last Monday night's meeting. At an earlier meeting this year they had instructed Village Solicitor Lyle Merritt to request the county commissioners to terminate service with a year's notice.

A clause in the agreement entered into between the two counties when the 19-mile 10-inch main was extended from the Ashtabula terminal point at the county line to the Perry township line in Lake county, permits Ashtabula county to cut off services with a year's notice.

Before taking final action, the council wanted to know whether the present water line would be sufficient to supply the resort if Lake county were cut off.

Robert Johnson, representative of the Ashtabula Water company, said he believed the line would be adequate with Lake county off and that there are approximately 800 users in that county. He indicated that if Lake county line were eliminated it would also eliminate the friction loss because of the distance would be shortened.

He suggested that while the line would be adequate, it would be necessary sometime in the future to erect a water tank or standpipe.

It was generally felt that regardless of the action taken in obtaining sufficient water, rates would be increased.

The Geneva Savings and Trust company will be the depositor for the village during the next twoyear period, it was announced at Monday night's meeting.

Jolly Foresees Action On Beach Erosion Problem

"It looks very much like we're going to get some action on the beach erosion problem," C. E. Jolly. head of the local Chamber of Commerce, commented following his return from a meeting of the Ohio Shore and Beach Preservation association in Cleveland last Tuesday.

He said that for the last 12 to 15 years various surveys had been made, but that no action had been taken. With the state's \$1,075,000 appropriation to become available Oct. 15, Jolly said that several approaches were being planned for erosion control.

"The thing most people don't understand is that public money cannot be allocated for private property unless the property is transferred to the government."

Jolly reported that according to Leonard Stearn who explained the recently enacted Senate Bill 192 at the meeting, a group of private property owners could get relief by filing in Common Pleas Court that a conservancy district be formed, thus making them eligible for government aid. All the letails have not been worked out, particularly in the estimated costs involved, Jolly said.

Village Property Tax Rate Lowered

Tax rate on property at Genevaon-the-Lake has been lowered for 1948, according to John Zimmerman, village clerk, who attended a budget hearing in Jefferson Wednesday.

The rate set for 1948 will be 16.80 in comparison with 17.70 this year. The lower rate was partially because of the increased property evaluation here, Zimmerman said.

A breakdown of the rate listed the county as receiving 2.52; township, .58; village, 4.40; and school, 2.50. Outside the 10 mill levy 6.80 was set for debt purposes.






