Mrs. Hazel Swan, whom many residents here will remember as former owner of the Lakeview cottages, is back at the lake again after an absence of two years.

She recently purchased the Harbor View cottage on Doctors' drive from Glenn Chapman.

"I'm the happiest I've been since I sold out," she laughed. "Once you've lived here, you just aren't satisfied any place else."

Mrs. Swan is planning to build a retaining wall similar to the one she had at Lakeview cottages. She has rented out her new lakefront cottage for the remainder of the season to Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Landon and daughter, Shirley, and Marie Montgomery, all of Geneva.

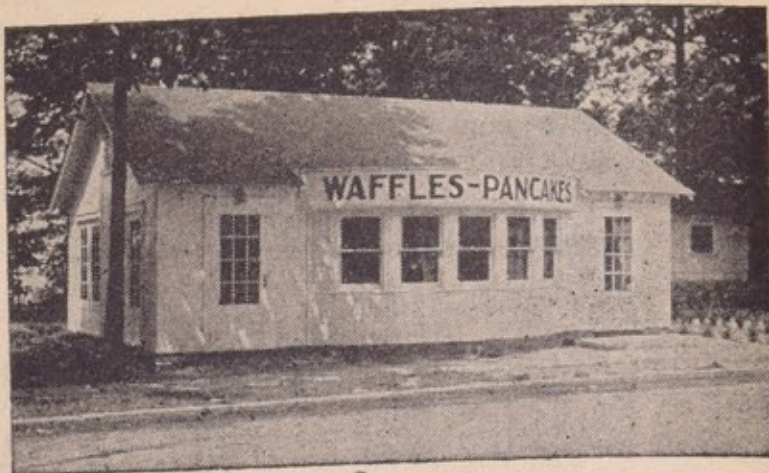

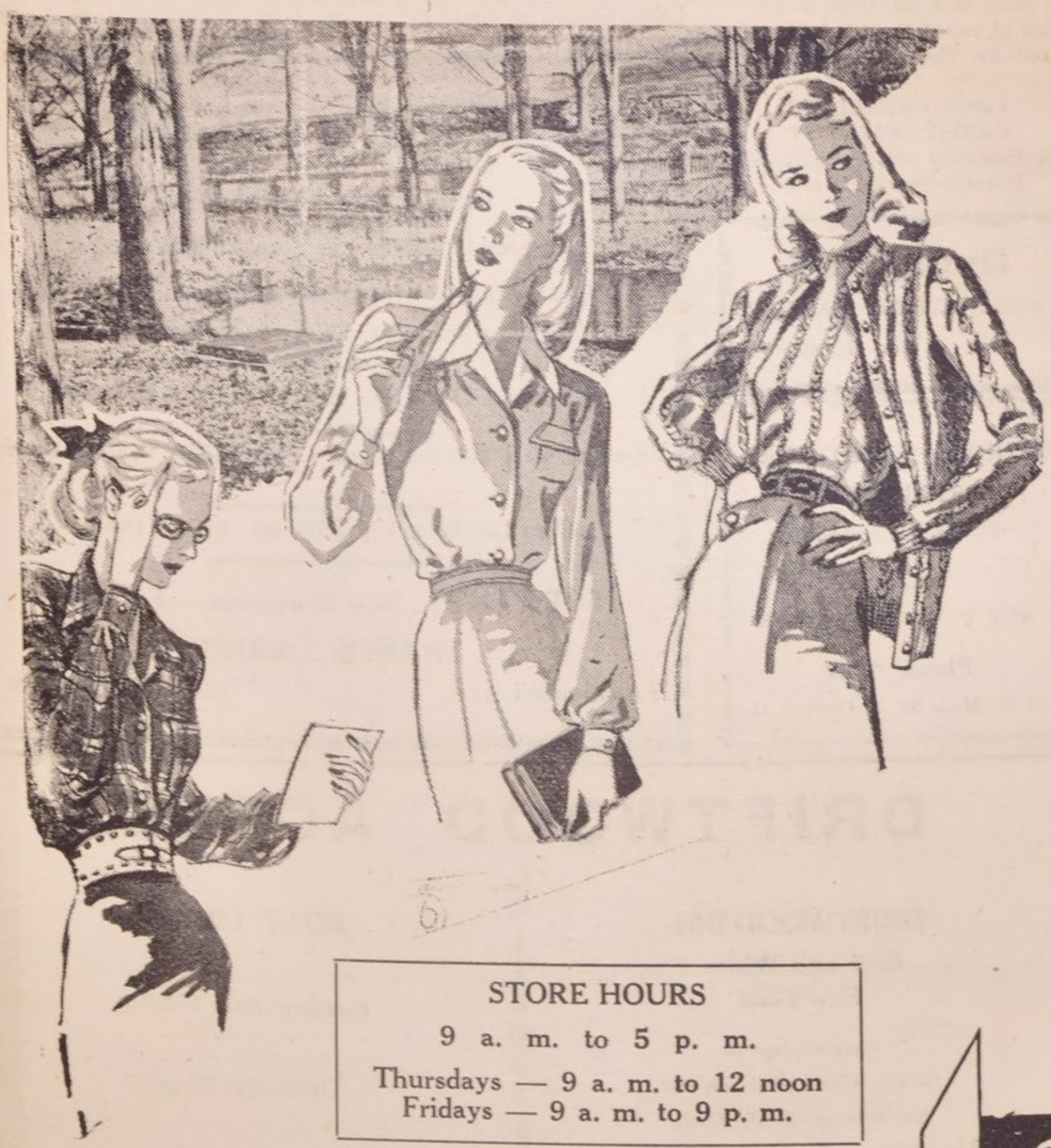

The Downward Trend

People are becoming more and more price conscious these days, the economists say, and while Mr. John Doe still has shekles jingling in his pockets, he is being mighty careful just where and for what he hands them out.

The lush money of the war years, however, has been spent, and there is a gradual return to normalcy. Almost every business has felt the change—even the resort business, although it is generally believed that this latter business will hold up its present level for a good number of years.

People are still vacation-hungry. They sat home during the war and it has only been within the last couple of years that families have gotten together again. Transportation facilities are getting better and competition will gradually bring about cheaper rates and still better accommodations. Although the outlook on that new automobile looks stormy more often than it does bright, the experts tell us that it won't be too long before the supply is going to catch up with the demand, and prices will be lowered accordingly.

And people are getting stubborn about prices. They simply won't pay the price on some things. When an item is scarce, it is always tempting to jack up the price and a rise of price in one thing necessarily will raise the price in others. It gets to be a vicious circle until it is stopped.

We have noted that there has been a gradual lowering of prices—particularly food prices—at the resort, and that is a healthy sign. It is the wise man who takes stock of his business and sets his prices so that he can make a reasonable but not an exorbitant profit. Is it not better to sell 10 apples at 15c than three at 25c?

Prices are not expected to go back to their pre-war level for many years to come—if ever, but it is evident that they must be lowered to meet the reduced purchasing power of the public.

And gradually this fact is being realized by resort people and prices are being lowered accordingly.

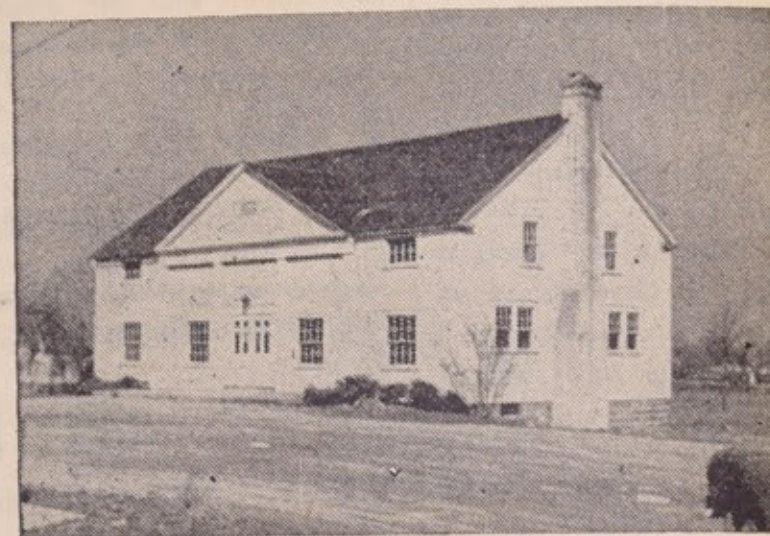
