Lanning's (formerly the Charles Rowe's) The Keystone, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Flory's The Hollyhock, Mrs. Mary Post's The Augustine; Mr. and Mrs. R. G. Reynolds' Rosalee; Matilda Ferritto's Carlomar, better known as Mary's Kitchen (Um-m, that spaghetti); Jane and Vin Helbling's cottage; and Mrs. Edith G. Rose's Alta Vista.

On the east side of the street starting with Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Gaetano's lakefront guest house, Ellen Rae Ellis' The L-Rae, L. R. Barrett's cottage, The Morningthorpe; Homer Shatto's residence and The Buckeye Lodge, Porter's Midway (you'll have fun there), and The Playtogs shop (with souvenirs galore).

That brings it up to date. His-

torically speaking it could be taken there built one of the first cottages on the street (Barrett's) and E. O. Munger, cousin to Jennie Gregory of "Grandview," built the L-Rae cottage and later built the Gaetano cottage. He lived there around 25 years.

Alta Vista was built during the first decade of this century by the Phillips family of Geneva and the annex was built later by Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Summer of Geneva.

Munger's son-in-law, Vern Atkins, was the original owner of the Helbling cottage. Bert Maltby of Geneva was the original owner of The Rosalee cottage. Today, one of the oldest residents is Mrs. Post who has been here for the last 33 years.

She remembers the days when kerosene lamps were used and there was no gas, no electricity, and no running water.

Mrs. Post has a daughter who is with her at the lake, Mrs. G. B. Atkins, and she has a granddaughter living in California, Mrs. Grace Mary Diemer.

Clarence Hoskins built The Buckeye in 1914 and he built The Hollyhock cottage in 1921. The Buckeye was operated as a boarding house and after the dining

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Engineer Explains Bin-Type Wall To Stop Beach Erosion

H. Bruce Baty, sales manager for the Armco Drainage & Metal Products, Inc., Cleveland, met with a group of lake-residents and explained the Armco Bin-type of retaining wall for the prevention of erosion.

Baty was here upon the request of O. W. Anderson, of Barberton, owner of Edgewater Lodge.

It was pointed out that the railroads have used this crib-type of walls for many years in the building of culverts and so forth, and that walls of this type used on Lake Superior have held for 29 years, with no sign of disintegration.

"Every case is different and it depends on how much money the individual decides to spend to get what he wants," Baty said.

He said that the bin-type wall was less expensive than a comparative concrete wall. "You must have a good base," he emphasized. "If you don't go down far enough, the wall simply will not hold up," he declared.

The Armco Bin-type wall comes in ridged sections that are bolted together into a solid unit.

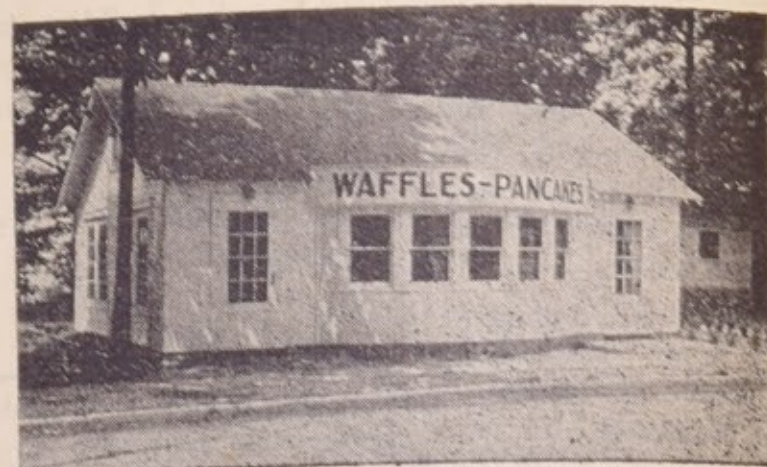

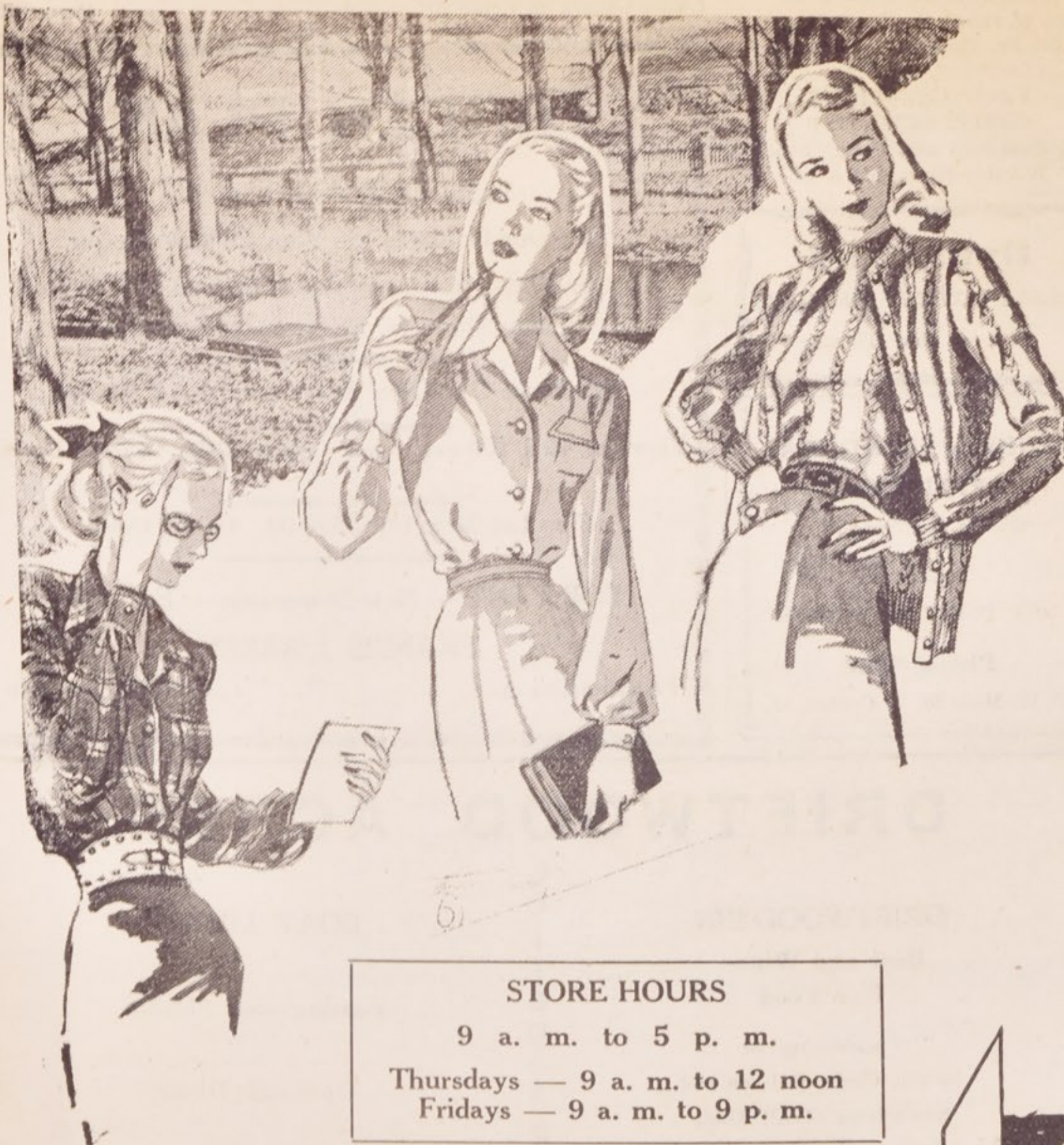

Cottage Names - - -

"A name is a kind of face whereby one is known." —Fuller.

Last year, we commented editorially on the great variety and versatility used in the naming of cottages at Geneva-on-the-Lake. It drew so many comments at the time that we are again broaching the subject.

One of the very unusual names is that of "Eugobode" cottages. Perhaps some of the guests staying there have figured it out from the last name of its owner which happens to be Bogue. Engobode is simply Bogue spelled backwards with -ode added.

Many names of lake establishments are suggestive of their surroundings, like Driftwood Acres, Beachmore, Harbor View, Lakeview, Lakeside Lodge, Lake Lane cottages, Bonnie-View, Lakeland, Silver Sands, Land-o-Sands, Grandview, Snug Harbor.

Some names of cottages carry humorous names, like Hi-Ho, Snoozy, Mary-Pop, Squeeze-In, Tak-a-Peke-In, etc.

Other cottage owners have named them after cities, like The Augustine cottage named after St. Augustine, Fla., where its owners have spent many winters. Then, of course, there is Youngstown Manor, The Greenfield, The Carrick, Lakewood Lodge.

Cottage owners with an appreciation for music have named their cottages Home Sweet Home, Stardust, Rosalee.

Then there are other cottages with a slightly continental flavor, like the Alta Vista, meaning beautiful view; Delwynn (Celtic), Inglemere.

Names like Sun-Kist, Cherry, Bluebird, Eagle Cliff, Green Gables, Erie-View, Rose of Sharon, Sunshine and similarly named cottages strike a particular mood.

And there are those that bear the names of their owners, or past owners, like Kramer, Morgan, Lomas, Oakley, Gaetano, Warner, Cannon's Court, Peterson's, Allen, and many others.

And the names of the cottages are something that vacationists will remember. Some of them will record in diaries, "Had a marvelous time in such-and-such cottages." They'll no doubt be pasted in scrap books. In the long winter months, their summer occupants will look wistfully out in the snow and murmur to themselves, "Such a perfect time in the ——— cottage!"

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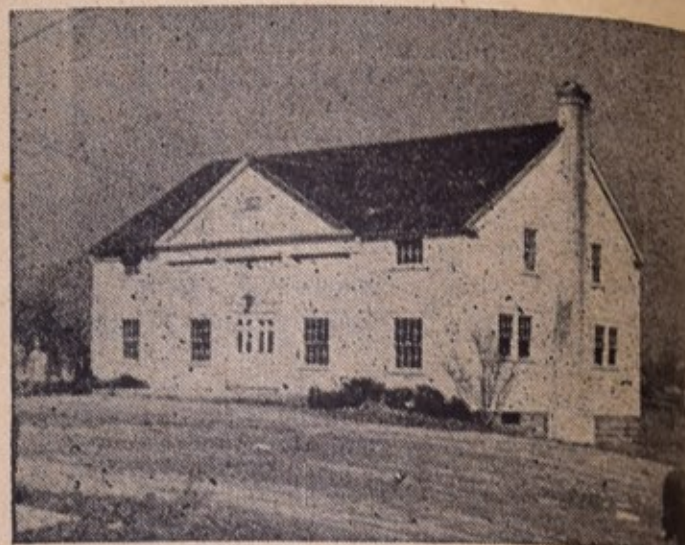
