"The course here is much tougher than those we play on in Pittsburgh," Mrs. Arnold said seriously. "There seems to be so much water around."

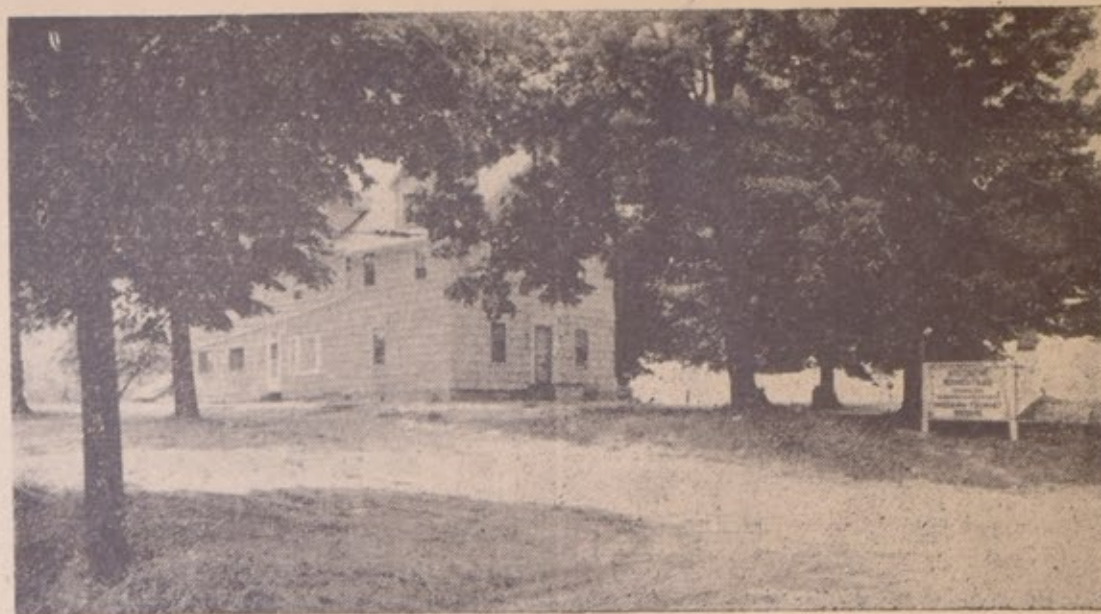
Also vacationing with the Arnolds was Miss Lois Semple. And, she plays golf too!



## Our Beaches--Our Lifeline!

Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday of this week the American Beach Preservation association held its national convention at the Breakers hotel in Cedar Point.

The convention was particularly significant this year because of the attention it placed upon the erosion problem.

"The loss of valuable property by beach erosion, as well as the detrimental effect on developing industry, has become so critical that it is imperative that an early program for its control be inaugurated" is a quote taken from the general report of the Ohio Post-Program Commission in 1944.

Not only Geneva-on-the-Lake, but every resort along the southern shore of Lake Erie is becoming cognizant of the fact that where the resort business along Lake Erie is standing at the brink of a new era in popularity, the problem of erosion could easily bring about its complete downfall.

It is generally conceded that Lake Erie's wide white sandy beaches are its greatest drawing card to vacationists.

It is interesting to note that approximately two-thirds of the citizens of the state live in the two rows of counties bordering the shoreline of Lake Erie. Some of the most traveled highways follow the shoreline and many of the state's largest industries are situated in this vicinity.

Wednesday sessions of the convention were devoted entirely to erosion problems, and several citizens of this resort were in attendance.

Some of the subjects discussed were "Permissive Conservancy Legislation for Beach Erosion Control," by Dr. Arthur E. Morgan, noted conservancy engineer from Yellow Springs, Ohio, who formerly headed TVA; "Federal Activities in the Field of Erosion," by Dr. Martin A. Mason, chief engineer of the Federal Erosion board.

The Canadian government sent Capt. G. W. Graham of the directorate of works and construction as a luncheon speaker and Col. Frank A. Pettit, army division engineer at Detroit, spoke on the subject, "Lake Levels."

Other authorities who spoke at the banquet in the evening included U. S. Senator James W. Huffman, Congressman Alvin E. Weichel of Sandusky, Col. C. L. Hall, senior member of the Federal Erosion board, and Congressman A. Dondero of Michigan, member of the erosion subcommittee of the House rivers and harbors committee.

George P. Larsen, executive secretary of the Shoreline Planning Association of California, Inc., who spoke on "California Shore and Beach Progress," indicated how the erosion problem is being met in California.

Inasmuch as this paper is a weekly, we were unable to get a complete account of the conclusions drawn from the convention in time for this week's paper. However, the findings of the convention will be presented in the subsequent issue.

We feel that it is important for property owners here to keep abreast of what is being done in the preservation of our beaches because that in the final analysis is the lifeline of all the resorts along Lake Erie.
