New Geneva Theatre To Change Program Daily

Charles Burt Is Resort's Oldest Vacationist

When a person is 90 years old, he is expected to take life easy in the family rocking chair and not go in for any strenuous exercise.

But this is not the case with Charles R. Burt, of Youngstown, who will be 91 years young on September 6. He takes life easy by spending his summers at Geneva-on-the-Lake and goes in for fishing in a big way.

Fishing is not a strenuous sport, but when a fisherman pulls in 17 fish in one day of fishing, that, brother, takes some work.

That is exactly what this 90-year-old gentleman did earlier this season at the little lake near Palmetto Beach.

Burt has been coming to Geneva-on-the-Lake for the last 25 years. His daughter, Mrs. Edith G. Rose, spent 10 years operating Lakeside Lodge and now manages two large lake-front cottages and annex on New street which go under the name of Alta Vista.

Uses Home-Made Pole

Burt, who is known affectionately by friends as "Burt, the fisherman," catches more fish with his home-made pole than sportsmen do with hundreds of dollars worth of equipment.

He cuts his own pole from a tree puts on a hook and line and just "sets" until the fish start to bite. He says that most of the 17 fish he caught this year were blue gills.

This sportsman doesn't especially like to go way out in the lake to fish but prefers to fish in small lakes or rivers nearby. But one thing he does like to do in the lake is to take a speed boat ride.

Leonard Gaetano, official life guard at this resort and operator of speed boats, took Burt for a 45-mile ride early this season. And Burt enjoyed that ride just as much as any vacationist would enjoy it.

Pretty Cute Gals

When Burt was questioned on the subject of women, he grinned and said he guessed there were some pretty cute gals on the beaches this year and that those bathing suits were something terrific!

Burt remembers when girls went in bathing with long dresses on. Even the men looked bedraggled in those sporty stripes of the gay nineties that clung down around the knees.

Which reminded Burt of the time when he was just a young blade and had golden opportunity present itself for a bit of tomfoolishness.

It seems that Burt was returning from a fishing expedition along the river. He came to a small lake and there he saw a party of gals about to go in swimming—long dresses and all.

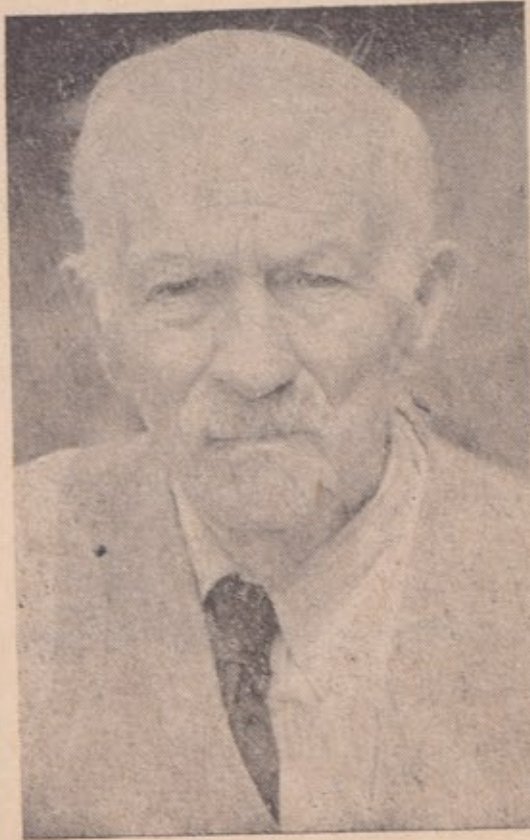
Almost Drowned

License Fees Due On July 15; Mayor Lists Cab Companies

All license fees for businesses at Geneva-on-the-Lake must be paid by July 15 in accordance with the village ordinance, it was announced this week by Mayor Murray Cook.

Garbage and room fees should be turned in to Edwin Koerner, official collector, Pittsburgh cottages, and all other fees should be paid at the village hall between the hours of 1 and 5 p. m.

Mayor Cook announced the following taxi cab companies authorized to operate at the resort this season: W. H. Lomas, Ray Slagle, R. L. Castle, King Cab Company of Geneva, Pasquale Vitale, Vets Cab Company, Checker Cab company, West End Cab company of Ashtabula.

The Council placed a limit of 10 taxi cabs to be located at the resort this season with only one license issued to any one person.

Theatre Opened Wednesday To Capacity Crowd

A capacity crowd attended the official opening of the new Geneva theater last Wednesday night and supported the theater throughout this week, including last night's midnight show.

A dozen feminine vacationists went home on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday nights with a pair of nylons tucked under their arms.

M. H. Greenwald, manager, said that although the "nylon attraction" won't be continued (He says that if he could get enough nylons to give away a dozen pair each night, he wouldn't be in the theater business.), there will be equally popular attractions each week along with the regular picture.

There will be a daily change of program and if there is sufficient demand a midnight show also will be run on Sunday nights, the manager said.

Charity Bingo

One of the attractions offered in conjunction with the new theater is charity bingo sponsored by the Assumption Catholic church, of Geneva. There will be \$1,200 in prize money at all times and 50c will be charged for a card.

The theater has the finest projection equipment that money can buy and has a seating capacity of 1,000.

Construction of the theater was started early this spring and shortages of materials and labor made it impossible to open in June as originally planned.

The theater's concessions will be operated by the Cleveland Concessions company who are at present operating the concessions at the Cleveland ball park and Cleveland stadium.

The theater is owned by the Resort Theaters, Inc. Wiring was done by Geneva Electrical Appliances.

The couple plan to build more cottages for the 1947 season. They are the parents of a 7-year-old son, Teddy, and a 5-year-old daughter, Judy.

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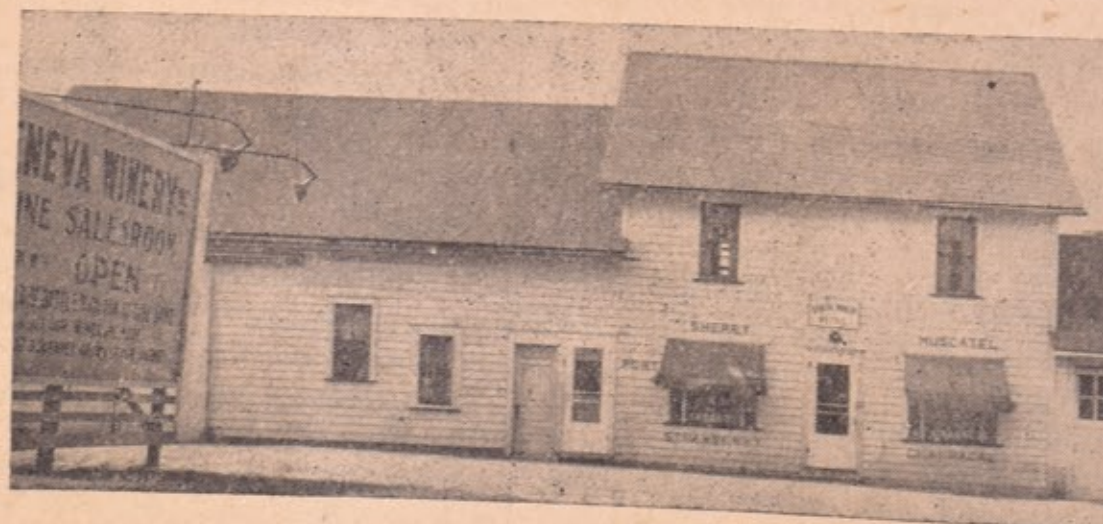
