Ceremonies for Bus

Geneva-on-the-Lake and Ashtabula officials participated in the cutting of a ribbon and christening of the Lake Road Transit company bus, "Miss Geneva-on-the Lake," with water from Lake Erie, in celebration of the bus service between the two communities.

Following the ceremonies at the resort boundary line, the delegation met for breakfast at the Cleveland Inn.

Richard P. Regner, chairman of the ride-the-bus committee, acted as toastmaster and introduced officials from both communities.

Murray Cook, mayor here, told the group that the bus service would increase real estate values and would be a vital factor in the development of the resort as a year-round community.

Clifford Kadon, president of the Ashtabula city council, said that with the influx of people along Lake road, the bus line would undoubtedly meet with success and pledged that Ashtabula would help in providing good service at their end.

Also introduced were C. E. Jolly, president of the resort Chamber of Commerce, who commented on the value of transportation to all resorts along Lake Erie, and Castle Smith, secretary of the Ashtabula chamber, who noted a building trend between the two communities.

Herman Langer, head of the Retail Merchants association of Ashtabula also commented.

Council To Crack Down On Glass Breakage On Beaches

The village council appropriated \$500 to clean up the beaches during the remainder of the season and discussed the formulating of an ordinance to prevent the breaking of glass on the beaches when they met last Monday night in the city hall.

It was brought out that glass on the beaches was a real menace to bathers and the proposed ordinance is expected to carry a penalty for violation of the ordinance. Action is expected to be taken at the next regular council meeting scheduled for July 21.

Mayor Murray Cook said that no provision had been made earlier in the season for the cleaning of the beaches because of a shortage of funds.

"That situation has been somewhat alleviated and we'll start cleaning the beaches where it needs it the most," Mayor Cook declared.

The council transferred the \$500 amount from the sewerage and drainage appropriation. The work is to fall under supervision of the street department headed by Ed Lomas, street commissioner.

The mayor urged that private property owners cooperate with the beach cleaner and help keep their own beaches clean. At the time this paper went to press no one had been named for the job but several persons were under consideration.

More Water

The council devoted a considerable part of the meeting to discussion of the water situation and the mayor along with Councilmen Art Taylor, Lawrence Paul, and George Konold were expected to attend a meeting of the Ashtabula County Commissioners today.

John R. Burns, head of the garbage committee, asked both cottage owners and businesses to cooperate with the garbage collector. He pointed out that garbage cans were required to be 30 gallons or less and must have covers.

It was brought out that over the fourth, the village experienced four of the biggest days in their history and that with the crowds jamming the resort, the garbage collectors were slowed down somewhat in their work.

The council passed an ordinance for the lease of land from the Geneva Park Land company to be used as a garbage dump at \$100.

Bids for street lighting service from the Cleveland Electric Illuminating company were received and a contract was awarded for a five-year period. Fifty and 100 candle power lamps are maintained and an increase at the center to 250 candle power already has been authorized.

A rate ordinance fixing the maximum rates of electricity for the village was passed for a four-year term.

The council also heard a third reading approving the Golf avenue subdivision developed by Vic Goettel but not accepting the streets therein.

New Geneva Jeweler

A new jeweler in Geneva this year is Einar F. Oberg, formerly of Warren, who purchased the jewelry store at 8 East Main street from the late G. Marcham Gates. Mr. Gates had operated the store for 20 years.

Oberg has had 22 years experience in the jewelry business and was formerly with the William Gartner jewelry store in Warren.

He has a wife and two children, Doris Jean and Howard.

Chamber Building

The local Chamber of Commerce will meet Wednesday to review their activities during the past year and draw up plans for the annual election of directors to be held early in August. Letters will be sent out to all paid members, according to C. E. Jolly, head of the local group.

The 36 x 50 cement block building being erected by Jolly for use of the Chamber of Commerce is expected to be completed in two weeks, Jolly said.

The building will house the Chamber's public telephones and will have two openings for commercial use.

H. L. Barber of Geneva is doing the construction work and A. D. Nichols is doing the carpentering.

Village Has Headaches, Too

Fourth of July week always is a hectic one and this year it was even more hectic than usual because it was the "biggest" three-day holiday in the history of the resort.

With the season at its height, there are numerous problems arising and in last Monday night's council meeting the city fathers aired their opinions and came to some rather definite conclusions.

One thing they decided to do was to take another whack at the county commissioners and see what could be done toward getting more water. The pressure was "awfully" low over the holidays and some residents are getting "awfully" irate.

The council has spent not only time but money on the problem and during the winter they not only met upon several occasions with the county commissioners, but they also had a hearing before the public utility commission in Columbus. The case was presented by a legal representative for the village and they have hired an attorney to look after the village interests. It also must be pointed out that the council has had representatives of the Ashtabula water company at council meetings to discuss the problem.

THE COUNCIL HAS THUS GONE TO THE THREE MAIN SOURCES IN SEARCH OF A SOLUTION, BUT NO RESULTS HAVE BEEN OBTAINED FROM THE PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION, NOR THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS, NOR THE WATER COMPANY.

Today, Mayor Cook with Councilmen Konold, Taylor and Paul are attending a meeting of the County Commissioners to press the matter further.

An ordinance to prevent the breaking of glass bottles on the beaches with a penalty attached discussed by the council last Monday night would seem to be a good idea. Broken glass on the beaches is a real menace to bathers.

Property owners will be glad to know that the village has appropriated money to clean the beaches. Let's all cooperate with the beach cleaners. If you enjoy a clean beach, clean up after that beach party so that those coming after you will have a clean beach too.

We imagine that lots of merchants in the village have forgotten Ordinance 240 which states that no rubbish shall be permitted to remain in front of their establishments longer than 72 hours. It takes only four or five minutes to pick up that rubbish in front of your shop each morning. Keeping the resort looking "ship-shape" is mighty important in giving the newcomers a good impression!

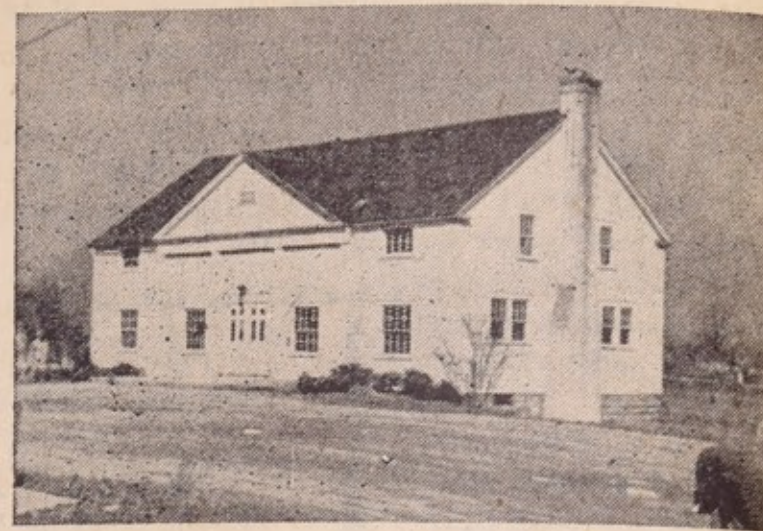

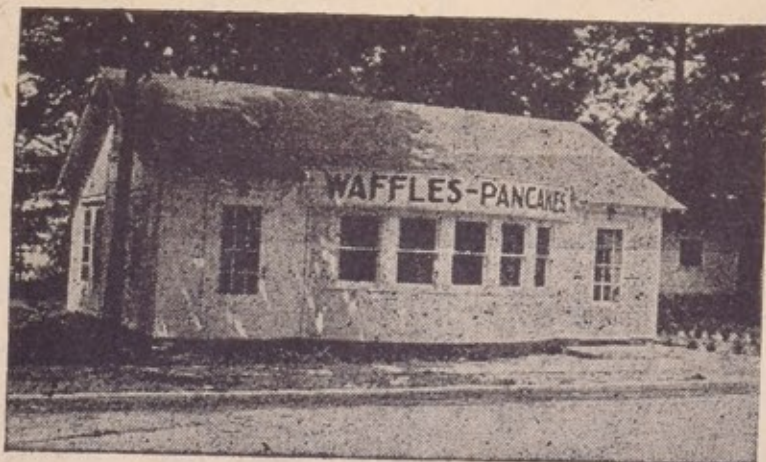
