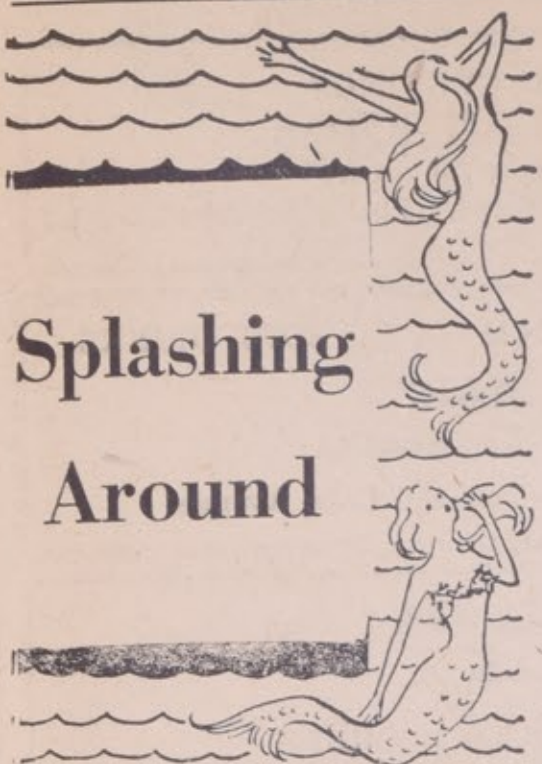

Everyone likes to take home gifts and Mrs. John M. Soderstrom who operates the Soderstrom's Antique shop suggests: "Why not take home an antique as a gift?"

She opened her shop after spending years of collecting antiques as a hobby.

Mrs. Soderstrom said that she finally had so many antiques that her husband put his foot down and said that it was either the antiques or himself who would have to move out.

We suspect that Mr. Soderstrom sort of likes antiques too because he built his wife a charming shop in their new home and so both antiques and husband remained intact!

Mrs. Soderstrom opened her shop on Memorial Day. She has a lovely Paul Revere lantern, Pennsylvania Dutch candle holders, Wooden lemon squeezer, a fine collection of cups and saucers, and exceptionally fine antique brass lamps.

She Knows the Story

But most important, Mrs. Soderstrom has a story to tell about practically all of her antiques. She enjoys the stories about them as much as collecting.

One of her most interesting pieces is an old chest which came from England in 1841 and was

He spent five years in the Pasadena playhouse and when he left that group he received the best recommendation ever given out.

He was tagged "Beautiful hunk of man" while playing in a stage production in New York and the name has stuck.

Best Picture

Evans said his best picture was made with Rita Hayworth in "My Gal Sal." At the time they were very much in love, but it was just one of those things, it didn't last, Evans said.

Bud visited Vic's home in Louisville, Ky. He said that the star's mother was a wonderful person and served them a marvelous chicken dinner.

"She is a very active club woman and donates both time and money to charity," Bud said.

Council Expects Fees' Collection To Be Good

Collection of village fees was considered to be good when the council met Monday for their regular meeting. All fees were expected to be in by Saturday of this week.

Edwin Koerner of Pittsburgh cottages, official collector for garbage and room fees, told the council that notices had been sent out the preceding week.

The village hall remained open for collection of village licenses from 1 to 5 p. m. It was urged that all fees be collected by the weekend under penalty of the ordinance.

New Water System

A considerable portion of the meeting was devoted to a discussion of a new water system for the village. A representative of the water company will be present at the next meeting. In the meantime a check will be made on the pressure.

Cleaning of Beaches

The problem of keeping the two miles of beaches clean was discussed by the council and it was decided that oil drums will be placed at convenient intervals so that individuals will have a place to throw refuse and thus aid the two men contracted by the village to clean the beaches.

Mayor Murray Cook appointed J. Arthur Snyder as special policeman. It was announced that the village now has 23 policemen.

The matter of bicycle fees was referred to the second meeting in September.

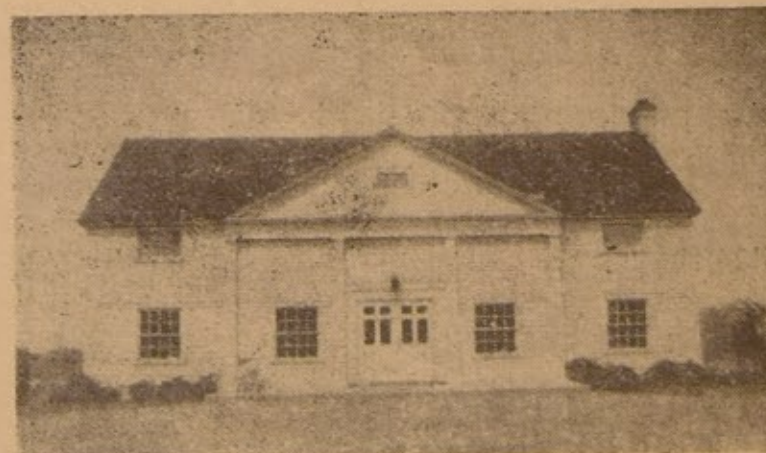
The council also made it clear that any business place that required a state license shall be classified as a restaurant.

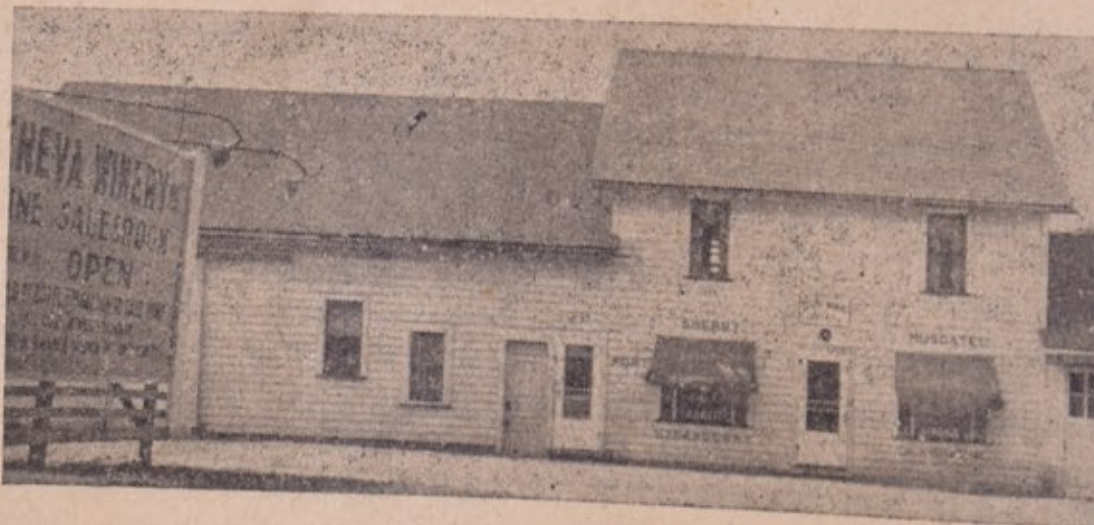

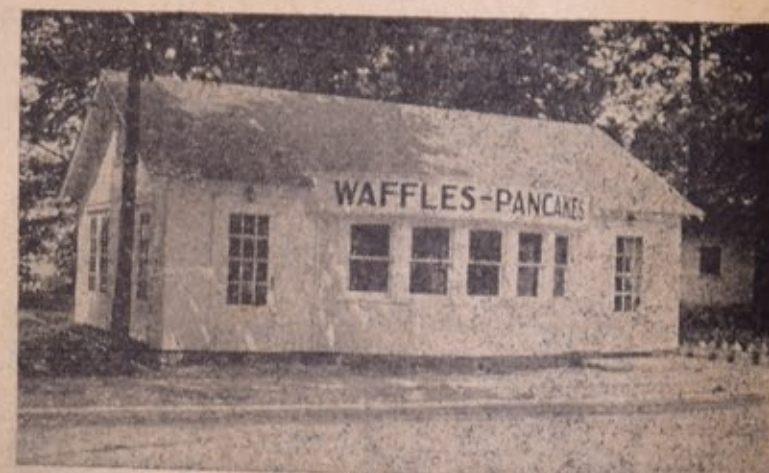

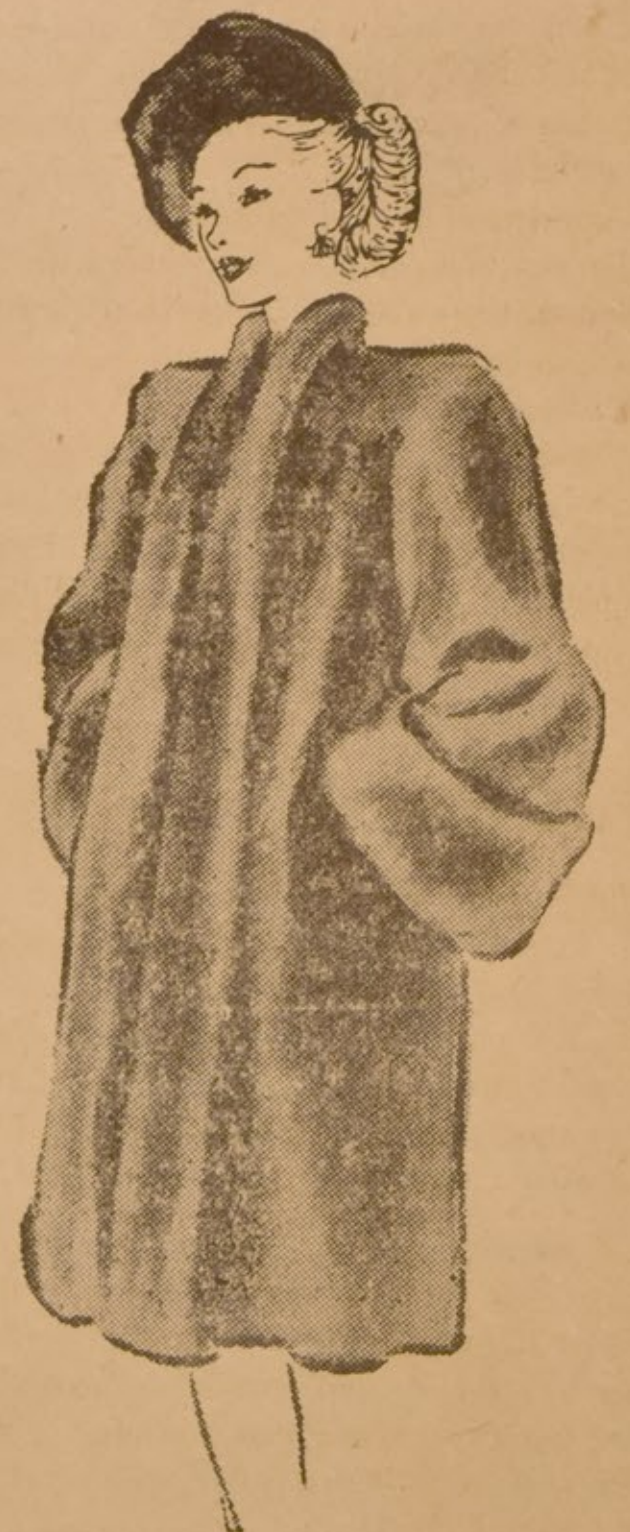

Health Hints for Vacationists

We hate to be a stickler on the subject of health and safety while on your vacation at this resort, but the health advisory council of the National Chamber of Commerce has thrown out some health hints for summer vacation trips that are worthy of your attention.

However, before listing some of their suggestions, we would like to point out that Geneva-on-the-Lake is just about the most "healthy" spot any vacationist could choose to spend his vacation!

Close supervision over sanitary conditions has been maintained by both the village and individual cottage owners.

The health committee advises vacationists to be particularly careful of getting too much sun. Remember that the treatment of severe sunburn may require spending several days of vacation time in bed under a doctor's care.

"Avoid ivy poisoning before you learn the 'hard way' by personal experience" is another timely suggestion for summer pleasure seekers.

We have made several inquiries and have heard of no poison ivy within the beaten paths of the resort but if anyone is adventuresome enough to go hiking in nearby woods there is the possibility that there is some growing there.

If exposed to any of these poisonous plants, wash the surface of the skin promptly with yellow laundry soap and rinse repeatedly. Clothes can be decontaminated by immersing them in 1 per cent solution of calcium phyochlorite for 15 minutes. Do not apply vaseline or alcohol on the skin as they may spread the rash. Care must be taken that serious infection does not occur.

There has been no infantile paralysis at this resort but because poliomyelitis does occur during the summer months, it is well to take the simple precautions recommended by the Chamber's health advisory council:

1. Avoid chilling and overtiring.
2. Do not swim or bathe in polluted waters. (Water is tested at Geneva-on-the-Lake and is perfectly safe for swimming.)
3. Wash hands before eating.
4. Protect food from flies.

These are simple rules of health to follow. We are anxious that you have a glorious vacation at Geneva-on-the-Lake with no mishaps of any sort. Besides the lake, there is any number of things planned for your entertainment. All that the village asks of vacationists is to use common sense while enjoying their vacation.

This Paper Takes Footwork

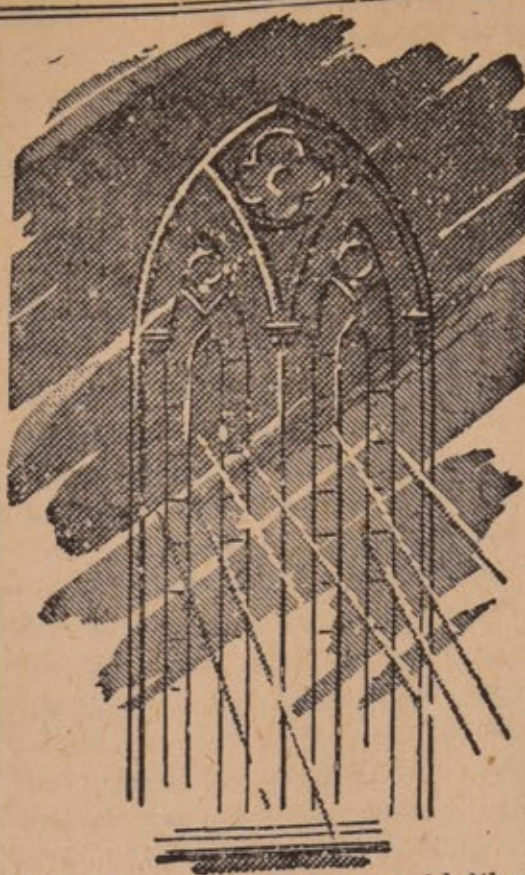
