Warner Family Has Been Prominent In Early History

The Warner family has played a prominent role in the history of Geneva-on-the-Lake and symbolic of its part is the spacious Hotel Colonial built by the late Charles M. Warner who was elected the first mayor of the village when it was incorporated in 1927.

Following closely in his father's footsteps. Howard Warner, Geneva attorney, was elected the second mayor and became the youngest mayor in the State of Ohio at that

Mrs. Charles Warner said that the hotel was built by her late husband 37 years ago and that he not only drew up his own plans for the building but also did his own carpentry and made the cement blocks for the foundation.

The inside of the hotel is finished in golden oak and the structure is made of all hard woods cut from the timber lands south of the golf course. He had a sawmill moved onto his property and after cutting the wood he hauled it in to Ashtabula with a team of horses and bobsled to the Post Brothers who prepared it for building.

He also landscaped the hotel grounds, planting the maples and silver birches that surround the hotel. At that time there were only three cottages at Mapleton Beach.

Mayor Murray Cook appointed Mrs. Keyes Tells of First Summer Resort Guests

What was it like a half century or more ago when the first families at Geneva-on-the-Lake began to take in a few boarders for the summer, thus marking the beginning of a modern summer resort?

> Mrs. Jennie Warner Keyes can give you the answer. Her father, Nelson Warner, was born in a log cabin built by his father, Reuben Warner, who came here via the Erie Canal and covered wagon from Connecticut in 1828.

Mrs. Keyes tells that her mother, Mrs. Nelson Warner, began taking people in for the summer about sixty years ago. Among the first families to come were the C. O. Bassetts of Cleveland who came for sixteen successive summers; the Melton family of Cleveland with a record of 26 summers to their credit; Mr. and Mrs. Frank Scofield, and others.

"It got so that the people were more like relatives," Mrs. Keyes laughed. "The families came as soon as school was out and the men worked during the week but always managed to get here over the week ends."

She said that her father met them with a team of horses and a lumber wagon in Geneva. Usually the summer folks were dressed in long grey flannel dresses with wide-brimmed straw hats and white bows at their collars.

And, what took the place of juke boxes, and all the various games and other diversions to be found here today? Well, there were hayrides, picking big luscious blackberries in the patches which dotted the woods where the golf course is now laid out, sunning themselves and swimming on the beaches (only the gals were more careful of getting freckles and keeping that peaches and cream complexion), and dancing at the dance hall at Sturgeon Point (Mapleton Beach).

The dance hall was finally cut in two and remodeled to make two cottages (The Ford and The Shelley cottages in Mapleton).


And then, there was the fishing! It was nothing to see 25 or 30 boats out in the lake and they really hauled in the fish-mostly perch, bass, pike, white fish or cat fish, and occasionally a sturgeon which weighed as high as 120 pounds or more.

Mrs. Keyes recalled that once her father caught a huge 10 pounder and that she had to stuff and bake it because her mother was ill. Mrs. Keyes was just 17 and they had 24 boarders.

THE HOTEL COLONIAL was built 37 years ago by the late Charles M. Warner whose father, Nelson, was born in the old log cabin, later known as The Homestead and known today as "The Oakmont."

Originally, Reuben Warner, his grandfather, owned a 175-acre tract. The 75 agres belonging to his father, Nelson Warner, extended to where Mapleton Manor now stands. Nelson Warner divided the property up among his sons, Milo and Charles, and daughters, Jennie (Mrs. Keyes) and Ruby Mason (de-

The descendants of Milo Warner still own the property on the east side of Warner drive; the Charles Warner family in addition to the hotel and grounds own the lovely jake front cottage, Spruce Point, on the west side of the drive; Mrs. Keyes sold her lake front property (Lakeland) where the Twin Birches stand and maintains her Orchard

A large portion of the property to the south wah given to the vil-

lage for use as a golf course by Charles Warner, and his mother sold an additional 30 acres to the village.

The Oakmont formerly was called The Homestead and belonged to Truman Warner, brother of Nelson Warner. His son, Bert, built Eagle Cliff and his daughter, Meda, operated the Homestead for many years. This was the original Warner home.

Another settler here was R. M. Hoskins (more about this in a later issue) and Walter Rose who owned the Rose cottage which has been made into Pittsburgh Lodge and also the property where Pennsylvania Lodge is now located. This property was originally owned by Warren Spencer. Mrs. Spencer sold the Shady Beach hotel property to Art Bowers.
