

Refrigerators are replacing worn out old ice boxes; gradually, new apartment size gas and electric stoves are replacing smelly kerosene and old-fashioned gas ranges; many cottages are equipped with hot and cold water; innerspring mattresses are replacing those oh-so-hardand-bumpy type mattresses; some provide their guests with radios; others have baby beds and high chairs for those desiring them; and numerous other improvements can be noted in the general appearance of the cottages.

With rising costs of labor and material, it is only natural that cottagers felt it necessary to raise their prices; but with this increase they are, on the whole, making improvements and bettering their establishments.

This is as it should be. In these times it would seem wise to put your business in the best possible shape. When times are not so good, it will be the cottage owner who has made the most improvements and whose attitude has been best in dealing with visitors at the resort who will continue to do good business.

It's the same way with the resorts along Lake Erie on both the Canadian and American sides: The resort that keeps abreast of the times and whose business people maintain a friendly, courteous attitude toward its visitors, will do the business when times are bad.

Maybe you're filled up for the season. It's annoying to answer the question of the tired traveler at the door . . . you don't see how you're going to answer those letters . . . but do it! You'll be repaid in the end!

Yes, it must have been wonderful back in the 1870's and 1880's to spend a week at Geneva-on-the-Lake for only five dollars, but modern plumbing facilities are pretty nice and when you get right down to it, most of us enjoy doing a few things more than just swimming, eating, and sleeping . . . like a game of golf, the theater, the many, many games in the midways, hayrides, bicycling, etc.




