

Noon Luncheon Planned for Tour Group

Sixty persons are expected to attend a luncheon at Idle-a-While Monday in honor of the Lake Erie Land Conference group making a four-day tour of major lake resorts.

C. E. Jolly, head of the Chamber of Commerce here, will represent the resort on the tour.

Forty persons will leave Cleveland at 10 a.m. Monday on a special chartered bus. First stop is Geneva-on-the-Lake where they will inspect the resort following the luncheon at Idle-a-While.

Their first night will be spent at Buffalo. They will visit resorts on both the Canadian and American shores of Lake Erie and will cover 700 miles during their four days' trip.

"Anyone is welcome to go," Jolly pointed out. "Cost for the trip is \$41.50."

The Chamber head said that the trip was scheduled so that the Lake Erie Land Conference might get a first hand picture of Lake Erie resorts for comparison purposes.

"It's a good idea to see what the other resorts are doing, especially this year when all resorts are expanding to handle the record crowds expected."

Jolly said that the Chamber was receiving an average of 15 letters per day inquiring about places to stay.

"I honestly don't know where we're going to put them all," Jolly said. He said that many people wrote in letters that they didn't care what it cost just so they could get accommodations for a vacation.

The Chamber head and his wife attended the Kiwanis convention in Atlantic City last weekend. He is vice-president of the Geneva Chamber of Commerce and attended the convention as a delegate. This weekend he will attend the Mid-Atlantic divisional meeting of the Ancient Order of Samaritans of which he is the supreme monarchos.

Public Phone Stations Listed

For the convenience of summer guests there will be 12 public telephone pay stations located at the resort, according to a recent survey.

By the first of July the local Chamber of Commerce will have six phones installed at the village hall with two secretaries to help make correct change.

Other pay phones are located at MAPLE MANOR, PENN LODGE, PERA RESTAURANT, BURNS' TEXAS BARBECUE, CHESTNUT GROVE, and LAKESIDE LODGE.

When making local calls to Geneva, Perry, Madison, or at the resort, drop the coin after the party answers. If you drop it in before, you'll lose your nickel as there are no coin returns.

The booths are completely soundproof if the person making the call will talk directly into the phone.

Historic Tavern Opened Again

The historic Old Tavern at Unionville that dates back to stage coach days in 1812, has been reopened this year by its owners, Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Fritz.

Patriotically closed during the war, its owners have operated the tavern since 1927. Vacationists may spend some restful nights in the delightful early American atmosphere and enjoy chicken, duck and steak dinners in its spacious dining rooms.

The dining room is open to the public this year. Mrs. Fritz said that reservations would be appreciated because of the food situation.

The tavern is one of three outstanding historical buildings in Ohio and holds a document from the government to that effect.

It is located in Unionville, one mile south of Route 20 on Route 84. Phone Madison 2236.

The 15-acre estate owned by Helen H, Jones is beautifully furnished with antiques and surrounded by spacious lawns sloping down to an exceptionally fine beach.

Guests are served dinners country style on the large veranda at drop leaf tables. Miss Jones does her own cooking and is anxious to once again serve her home made rolls and pastries. The hostess formerly taught home economics in Cleveland schools and has spent her summers at Pen'Bryn since 1929.

The large cottage was the lake home of her father, the late Franklin T. Jones. Born in Geneva, his grandfather, George Turner, had the first saw mill in the Western Reserve section just east of Indian Creek.

Model Ship

A cabinet-maker by trade, Turner made the lovely old secretary which Miss Jones now uses as a linen closet. He also made the cherry dresser now in her possession and the model of an old lake sailing vessel which visitors may see at the guest house.

Miss Jones said that her father collected many antiques including early farm implements and carpenters' tools. She has an ox yoke that was actually used years ago in tilling the soil at the lake.

It was pointed out that problems of materials and labor have made it impossible to open by the middle of June as scheduled earlier this spring.

Council Seeks More Efficient Garbage Collection

The "city fathers" of Genevaon-the-Lake were elbow deep in the discussion of ways to improve the collection of garbage at the resort when they met at the village hall Monday night.

The mayor appointed Edwin Koerner to collect the garbage fees for the season.

At the June 3 meeting of the Council garbage rates for all places of business that served meals were set at \$7.50. The rate was set at \$4.50 for cottage owners.

This was an increase over last year's rates, but councilmen pointed out that all expenses connected with the collecting of garbage had increased proportionately. The contract this year was reported to cost the village \$600 more than

it did last year.

Opinions Voiced

John Burns, chairman of the garbage committee brought in representatives from both the village business center and from the contracting company to voice their views of present methods of collection.

It was decided that the collectors should start at the center early in the morning and finish their collecting before that area became congested with traffic.

The contract calls for twice a week delivery up to and including June 30. Beginning on July 1, collections will be made daily at hotels, stores, and restaurants. Other places will be taken care of

The Geneva-on-the-Lake council passed a motion accepting a tentative budget for 1947 drawn up by the village clerk and finance committee when they met for their regular meeting Monday night.

A hearing for objections to the tentative budget is scheduled for 7:30 p. m. July I, at the village municipal building

The budget included \$10,000 for general fund purposes within the 10 mill limitation and \$12,482.85 for bond retirement outside the 10 mill limitations.

Broken down, the requested \$12,482.85 included \$3,360 of the park refund; \$1,800 sanitary and sewer refund; and \$7,322.85, four and one-half mill voted levy,

Suddenly the boat hit a rock and upset. The men were thrown into the water. The boatman called out to the student, "Can you swim?" The student cried back, "No." "Then all of your life is lost," the boatman shouted while swimming toward

This brings up the point that we never know at what time we may be called upon to save ourselves or another person from drowning.

Mayor Cook recently appointed Leonard Gaetano as life guard for the season. This is a heavy responsibility and calls for cooperation on the part of vacationists.

Here are a few safety valves for swimmers:

Never swim alone.

Avoid swimming at least two hours after eating.

Stop swimming when exhausted and assume a back float or tread. When rested, continue swimming.

When seized with a cramp, float and apply treatment, or swim on the back, using the arms if the legs are affected or vice versa.

Avoid long-distance swimming unless accompanied by someone in a boat. Remember, it is just as far back to the shore as it is going

If caught in the undertow (yes, there's an undertow on Lake Erie in rough weather), avoid struggling but recede with it until the next wave is met, then coast in on it, or swim with it and the following

Do not dive in unknown waters, jump in feet first or in a sitting position.

The Council has taken every precaution to assure the safety of vacationists while swimming. The resort is now equipped with a dual micro unit for the resusitator which makes it possible to care for two drowning victims simultaneously.

Cooperate with our life guard and avert vacation tragedies by using safety measures.
