

Mayor Compliments Chamber

Mayor Murray Cook said that he believed the Chamber had a great future and that "a great deal of credit should be given to the directors and to the chamber head, C. E. Jolly, for the organization of the group."

Jolly reported that the Merchants Board of Geneva recently made a donation to the Chamber and introduced E. L. Stiffler of Stiffler's grocery in Geneva, president of the Merchants' Board. Other officials and business people were called upon by Jolly for re-

Baldwin named beach erosion as the number one problem of the resort business which he pointed out is the third largest industry in the country. "If the beaches are not preserved, resorts cannot survive," he emphasized.


Petition Circulated

Earlier in the evening Jolly said that a petition circulating this spring contained 11,000 signatures requesting federal aid in the erosion problem and that it had been sent to Washington for action.

Other points on Baldwin's recommended program included better roads leading to the resort, more advertising, consideration of a breakwall for boats and cruisers, a building permit program, increasing cooperation between the merchants, banners at each end of the resort welcoming the vacationists, and a convention hall similar

Miller's Arcole Shore Estates Early Back Date

Arcole Shore Estates, a new 72acre lakefront cottage and permanent home development of The Miller Realty Co., located about two miles west of Geneva-on-the-Lake between Dock road and Elm street, is attracting the interest of buyers from many parts of Ohio and Pennsylvania, J. Earl Miller, president of the company, announces. One home already has been built and occupied and a second is under construction. Additional cottages and homes are planned.

The setting for Arcole Shore Estates is one of the most attractive on the southern shore of Lake Erie. The lake here is especially blue, the beach wide and sandy, the bank low. There are 1,900 feet of lake frontage. Minimum lot width is 50 feet. Restrictions have been drawn to carefully protect the development.

Interesting History

Interesting to the many readers of The Beachcomber is the history

connected with Arcole Shore Estates. At one time the Village of Arcole, located at the intersection of U. S. 20 and Dock road, was the largest iron producing center west of Pittsburgh.

Gone forever are the furnaces that employed 2,000 men in the early years of Ohio's history. And gone, too, are the wooden sailing ships and their builders who reaped fortunes from the iron makers and the steady stream of early settlers who disembarked from the long dock that jutted into the lake from what is now Arcole Shore Es-

In the early 1800's, when the name of Arcole became prominently identified with industry, the port already was established and active. Thousands of new settlers started their trek inland from this point.

U. S. 20 Born

With water transportation established, it was a comparably easy matter to set up the iron making industry after surveyors accidentally discovered ore in the lowlands soil through which they were laying out the new east-west highway, now U. S. Route 20.

No discovery could have been more welcome to the early settlers, who had been compelled to get their farm tools and bar iron from Pittsburgh and other points in the east. This was expensive and often there were costly delays because the supplies came into the territory in freight wagons bumping over narrow trails.

Arcole, under the conditions, was a "natural" for the new industry. The raw materials were here. Limestone was being unloaded at the dock from Kelley's Island. Ore and clay were native products.

Arcole Iron Co.

Old records of the territory show The Erie Furnace Co. was the first to get into production. It

Village To Be Out of Debt By Year 1951 Village Council officials predict-

ed that Geneva-on-the-Lake would be out of debt by 1951 providing conditions continue to boom or become normal within the next several years.

An open discussion at last Monday night's regular council meeting revealed that the majority of council members were not in favor of acquiring a new debt until the long standing old debt was paid off; although the members took cognizance of the many needs of the village.

Mayor Murray Cook told the council that in the near future the village would have to take care of its own garbage disposal. It was also pointed out that the parking problem could be alleviated by the purchase of a parking lot by the village. Another definite need which should have been met years ago is that of a public beach, owned and maintained by the village.

\$18,000 a Year

The village is retiring \$18,000 in bonds yearly and on January 1, 1948 only \$57,000 in bonds remain to be retired.

Clerk John Zimmerman presented the tentative budget for 1948 and a resolution was passed adopting the budget. The village asked for \$10,000 in the general fund and \$14,728.98 for debt purposes outside the 10 mill levy. Total amount for all purposes was \$24,728.98.

The Old Tavern Has New Owners

One of Ohio's oldest taverns, "The Old Tavern" in Unionville, was sold during the past year by its owners, Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Fritz to Ralph W. Fram and Ralph L. Traucht, both formerly of Cleveland.

The high standards maintained at the tavern are being upheld, Fram said, and emphasis is being placed on use of the ballroom for private parties. He pointed out that the tavern would furnish setups for those groups desiring to have cocktail parties before dinner.

He emphasized the use of the tavern as a home and said that this year the garden is open to afternoon bridge parties.

Although the dining room is open to the public without reservations, Fram requested that large groups make reservations ahead of time.

Established in 1812, the tavern is one of three outstanding historical buildings in Ohio and holds a document from the government to that effect.

It is located at Unionville, one mile south of Route 20 on Route 84. Phone Madison 2236.

following as special police: Lester Lippincott, Paul A. Johnson, L. G. Baldwin, Adolph Hefley, Robert Cramm, and John Kopp. Carl Pangburn was appointed on the regular force. He is a former policeman of Geneva.

The council heard a second reading on the ordnance approving the plot of Gulf-View subdivision developed by Vic Goettel, but not accepting the streets in the subdivision.

A restaurant was defined as any place where food is prepared in a resolution passed by the council, thus differentiating between a restaurant and a stand.

An ordinance regulating traffic and parking on Golf avenue in 1944 was repealed and a new ordinance passed which prohibits parking on the east side of Golf avenue to Green Lantern avenue and on the west side of the avenue to a point 50 feet from the intersection of Lake road.

Lyle Merritt, attorney, reported that the Ashtabula county engineer requested that an automatic recording guage be placed on the village water line where it joins at Saybrook and another undercover at the sewage disposal plant, in order to find out if the water pressure is adequate.

The county engineer indicated that the real solution to the water pressure problem was a standpipe and booster pump in Lake county. The engineer said that friction loss and the length of the pipe would make the placement of another meter at the point where the line leaves Ashtabula ineffective.

Annual State Report Shows Financial Status

The annual state report of the village prepared by Clerk John M. Zimmerman showed total receipts for last year amounting to \$58,-237.93 and total expenditures of \$51,544.92. The balance at the start of 1947 was \$36,297.77.

It must be pointed out, however, that of the amount, \$22,791.85 is in the bond retirement fund and can only be used in the payment of bonds and interest on the outstanding debt. The village debt now stands at \$82,000.

Receipts taken in included \$19,-587.19 in property tax; \$6,876.75 licenses and permits; \$1,460 in fines and costs; \$20,035.62 in park and miscellaneous fees. The balance of receipts are taken from cigarettes tax, state vehicle, special assessments, etc.

Expenditures include government administration operating costs of \$2046.19; protection of personal and property (police, fire), \$5412 .-



Debt Free By 1951

We cannot help but comment on the announcement made at last Monday night's council meeting that the village expects to pay off its debt by 1951.

According to Clerk John Zimmerman on January 1, 1948, there will be only \$57,000 in bonds left to retire. This means that if times continue to be good and if the village is able to continue paying off \$18,000 in bonds yearly, by 1951 the village will be debt free.

It must be pointed out, however, that the village is sorely in need of many things. Mayor Murray Cook told the council that the village must look forward to the time when they will have to do their own collecting of garbage.

Another need that should have been recognized and provided for years ago is a public beach owned and cared for by the village. Adequate parking facilities is a major problem when the season hits its peak.

So, it may be that the village will find it necessary to acquire a new debt some time in the near future; regardless of that, it is comforting to know that if no new debt is acquired, by 1951 the village is reasonably assured of paying off that old, long-standing debt!

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
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
