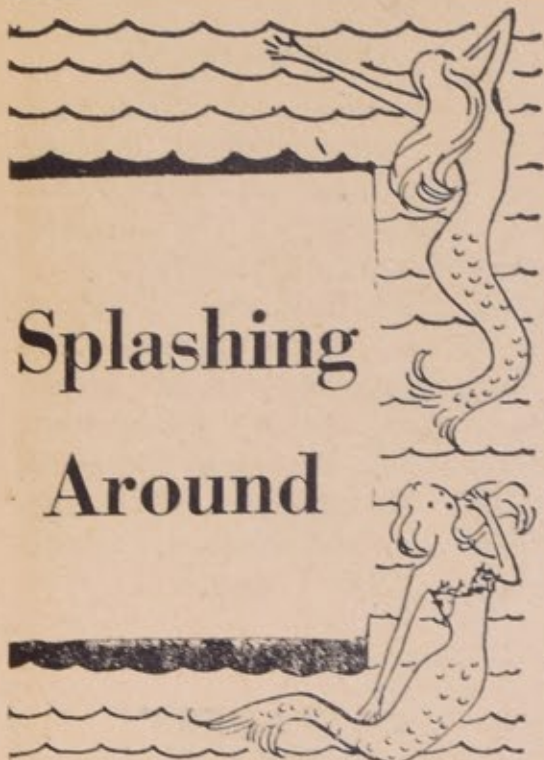

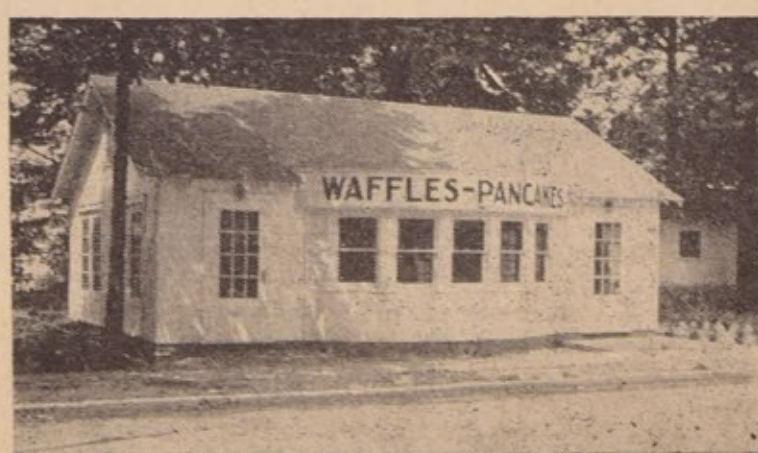

## Casey - Waters Development To Expand Resort

The new Casey-Waters development and subdivision on Austin road is another strong indication that Geneva-on-the-Lake is taking its place as one of the largest resort centers on Lake Erie.

The development consists of 36 acres of land purchased from Francis J. Breen, well known property owner here, by Dr. T. M. Waters and James Casey, experienced real estate man, both of Pittsburgh.

Casey disclosed that water, sewerage, electricity, and gas would be part of the improvements made on the development.

He pointed out that the property should be ready for sale near the end of the summer. Formerly known as Breenwood Acres, Casey said that the original blue prints were being revised.

It is popularly conceded that the resort proper ends at township park. The Casey-Waters development will erase this mythical boundary line and is an important step in developing outlying lake property in the expansion of the resort.

## Swim for Health Week

This year, more than any year since 1776, the Fourth of July has significance for all Americans. For in this, the first year of peace, the principles of the Declaration of Independence have come through for all mankind once again.

We spoke with some admiration of the way Hitler had organized German industry and agriculture. We sometimes doubted the ways of democracy then.

It was not just the common people who could not see fascism for what it was. The conservatives who were responsible for the appeasement policy of the English and who held sway frequently in our own state department tended to favor fascism over communism.

Fascism and totalitarian governments still exist despite our battlefront victory. General Franco in Spain and General Peron in Argentina direct appalling fascistic governments. Totalitarianism still exists in Soviet Russia, though there are increasing signs of greater political democracy in the Soviet Union.

Right here in the United States we have many evidences of attempts at the tyranny against which our ancestors pledged themselves to fight with "our lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor" on the original Fourth of July.

First big business and now labor have attempted to direct the affairs of the whole nation in their own interests. Governors and presidents once called out militias time and again to suppress labor. The press consistently supported management. Labor was always wrong—in those days.

But gradually the situation has changed. Labor, once forced to work from sunrise to sunset at jobs at which few if any protective measures had been taken at a wage based not on the subsistence needs of a normal family but on the cruel law of the supply and demand of labor, is now as potent as any single force in our nation.

Labor now is at the helm. Now nationwide strikes can be called which hit every community and every individual in the nation. Strikes on such a big scale inconvenience thousands and even, as in the recent railroad strike, caused hundreds abroad to starve. Our cherished principle of acting in the interests of the "general welfare" is being as much abused by some labor groups as it was by some of the management groups.

The Klu Klux Klan in our own country also is spreading its venom again—proof of the widespread religious and racial hatred rampant despite the victory of the so-called democracies in World War II. Many little battles against tyranny fought by little people in their daily lives remain to be fought.

But we did win a great military victory. And for that we rejoice. We deserve a chance to celebrate. It was a long hard pull, but we came through victorious. That's why a vacation at Geneva-on-the-Lake this Fourth of July can be the best ever.
