Membership into the Geneva-on-the-Lake Municipal Golf Course, set at 150 this year, is fast approaching that mark, according to John Evans, golf pro.

He reported that the course is in excellent condition considering the rainy weather during the last several weeks. Evans said that with a break in the weather, he expected a large turn-out for the Flag tournament on Decoration Day. The tournament is open to anyone who cares to enter and a small entry fee will be charged.

Four handsome trophies are on display at the golf stand. One will be given for the open championship, won last year by Harold Barrett of Geneva, and another will be given for the runner-up in this tournament.

A third trophy will be given for the Handicap tournament, won last year by Lee Peterson of Geneva, with Henry Jeppe as runnerup. A trophy also will be given for the runner-up.

Mrs. Jennie Dama of Youngstown, will operate the Dama Spaghetti House on a lot purchased in that sub-division. She will move from her former location next to John Zimmerman's Sohio station.

Mr. and Mrs. Wilson Finley of Pittsburgh have bought a strip of land from Lake road to the lake on the eastern boundary of the Edward Park property. They will erect a summer home there in the near future.

Tobias Sepac of Pittsburgh has purchased seven acres of land at Lake road and Meyers road and will build a summer house there.

Mayor Cook Appoints Police

That big "scoop" shovel laboring away on New street the last several days is a result of action taken by the Geneva-on-the-Lake village council this winter.

At their April 10 meeting, the village council accepted the bid of the Koski Construction company for the paving of this street at an estimated construction cost of \$3973.32. Actual cost for the sixteen foot stretch of asphalt and the construction of concrete curbs is expected to approximate \$5,000.

The council employed C. H. Kittinger as engineer to prepare plans and specifications and to supervise its construction. Lyle F. Merritt was employed to prepare a transcript of provisions in connection with the issuance of bonds for the paving.

J. F. Branford, John Evans, and Harold Hinkle were named on an estimating board for the assessments on New street.

Police Appointed

Mayor Murray Cook announced the following regular policemen appointed this year: Ed Donato, Leonard Farringer, Devilla Spring, James Hadlock, Charles Brott, John Fess, and E. G. Lomas.

Policemen sponsored by various lake property owners include Edward Park, Tony DeMarco, and John and Mike Evans.

At an early meeting in January, Mayor Cook announced that the committees would remain the same for the 1947 term. A. T. Lomas was elected president pro tem for this year.

Lawrence Paul was elected councilman to fill the vacancy made by the resignation of Walter Banig.

New Fire Truck

At their first meeting in April the council passed a resolution accepting the bid of Harry E. Holden to furnish a fire truck for \$3,643.-56.

The council also passed a resolution accepting the bid of H. H. Gladding for a jeep to be used in connection with golf course maintenance at a cost of \$1464.84.

The bid of Alonzo Reynolds was accepted in the April 22 meeting to collect garbage this year at a cost of \$2,100.

Village Re-appraisal

Mayor Cook gave a report on the re-appraisal of resort property conducted last year by the Cole-Layer company of Dayton.

Mayor Cook reported that as a result of the re-appraisal of resort property last year, the village appraisal was raised one-half million dollars and that the appraisal now approximated over two million, one hundred thousand dollars.

Sidewalks Inspected

At the May 5 meeting, Mayor Cook reported that E. V. Goettel requested a sidewalk grade line on Golf avenue, and the council directed that the street committee have an engineer set the grade line for the street. The council further motioned that the committee be authorized to inspect all sidewalks of the village and report those in need of repair.

At the May 5 meeting William Heasley requested the erection of steps at the Geneva township park. He informed the council that the residents in that section would landscape the approach to the steps and pay for a liability policy to cover accidents on same.

Miller Predicts Largest Season In Resort History

Barring unforeseen developments, Geneva-on-the-Lake shows evry promise of having one of the largest seasons in its history, J. arl Miller, president of The Miller Realty Co., of Geneva, revealed

Early demand for cottages is apprecedented, he said, making it ecessary for the company to open a Geneva-on-the-Lake office one onth earlier than customary to the care of the large number taking "on the spot" reservations.

The Miller Realty Co., representg owners of about 175 rental
nits, reported that many of those
ho were at the resort last year
re coming back for this season;
hat residents of Metropolitan
leveland, who have not been at
eneva-on-the-Lake in numbers
or many years, are again showing
n active interest; that many
oung groups will be represented
mong the summer visitors.

"We have had correspondence nd some personal inquiries all uring the winter months," Mr.

Miller said. "Inquiries really began to pyramid during the month of April and the demand became so heavy early in May that we were compelled to open our office at the lake in order to accommodate the heavy weekend crowds.

"In my opinion," Mr. Miller continued, "the early demand for cottages is the heaviest in many years. I think Geneva-on-the-Lake, based on reservations already made and the flow of inquiries coming to our office daily, can look forward to a very busy season."

Investors interested in developing additional cottage facilities also have been active during the winter and spring months, Mr. Miller stated. The demand for lake property, he said, has been the heaviest since 1930.


